GSP MATTERS FOR KENTUCKY

The Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) program allows U.S. companies to import certain products duty free from developing countries. **GSP should have waived tariffs** on \$18.6 billion worth of imports and saved American companies \$678 million in 2014.


However, GSP expired on July 31, 2013. As a result, American companies have paid more than \$1 billion in higher taxes – and will continue to pay nearly \$2 million per day until Congress passes legislation to renew GSP.




KENTUCKY'S GSP IMPORTS BY PRODUCT TYPE

(\$ millions)




KENTUCKY'S GSP IMPORTS BY SOURCE COUNTRY


GSP eliminates tariffs on certain products from nearly 130 countries, but the majority of Kentucky imports under GSP come from a handful of countries, led by **Thailand, Brazil,** and **India**.

Philippines, Thailand, and Brazil were the top countries by the value of GSP tariffs paid.
